Do You Live Alone? Do You Have a Medical-Alert System?



In the last two years, several members have fallen or been unable to stand up and get to a telephone when they were home alone. Very often, the greater danger to health is being immobile on the floor for 12, 24 or 48 hours. Can you imagine that? No one thinks it will happen to them. But it *will* at some point—no matter how careful we are; no matter how healthy we feel.

I urge everyone who lives alone to consider investing in some sort of life-alert that allows you to push a button on your wrist or around your neck, which alerts the medical security personnel who then call 911. Being rescued within 1/2 hour, reduces the risk of organ failure and other complications. It can make the difference between staying independent and moving to a nursing center.

But please check with friends who have used an alarm system. And note that you may be eligible to have costs paid by a government program through the Office of Senior Services.

Please check it out, and let me know if I can be of help in the process.



stop-doing lists. These are tasks that someone else should be doing, or tasks that don't have much impact in the long run but keep us busy and feeling useful." I took the blogger's advice and developed a "**To-Don't List.**" Here it is:

- 1. On Sunday morning, I won't unlock doors, turn on lights and sound system, and check rest rooms to make sure there are paper towels and toilet tissue. In the past, one person assumed that responsibility and when he left, I took over. But we now have excellent usher teams who can do it, and lock up after worship.
- 2. On Sunday morning, I won't make coffee. And I won't buy goodies and set up for fellowship hour when no one signs up to host. When I arrived, Lakehurst Presbyterian had coffee hour once a month when the deacons hosted. Because it wasn't routine, few people participated and some questioned the need for it at all. Now, the Upper Room is full most Sundays with people connecting and supporting one another and welcoming visitors. And now we have an outstanding Evangelism & Fellowship Team who can assume this task—if you sign up to help them!
- 3. During the month, I won't check on paper, plastic and cleaning supplies and go shopping. In the past, Laure Childers did this with petty cash, but that is not her job! Now each team has a budget and I trust that the Property and Fellowship Teams can take this on.

Believe it or not, without the frustration of wondering why plastic bags and coffee cups are disappearing, and without the extra Sunday morning tasks, I will have more time and much more energy to be a good pastor.

- 1. I will visit and bring communion to homebound members and friends of the church.
- 2. I will offer support and counseling, when requested, to the growing number of members who are in transition, ill or grieving.
- 3. I will use that time before worship to pray and I will be totally present to greet you and listen when you arrive.
- 4. And I will continue to pray for wisdom, patience and guidance as we move into God's future for the church.

In these last lazy days of summer, why don't you take some time to consider developing a **"To-Don't List."** What are you doing today simply because you have always done it. What else might you do if you had extra time and energy? Is God calling you to simplify and reprioritize your life?

National Asthma & Allergy Awareness Month By Your Parish Nurses

A series of sneezes, watery eyes, itchiness on your skin: all these things can be symptoms of allergies. People who have allergies have an immune system that reacts to substances (pollen, mold, and animal dander, for example) called allergens. 1 of 5 Americans suffers from allergies.

Treatment for allergy-related conditions such as asthma, allergic rhinitis, sinusitis, food, medication, latex, and stinging insect allergies, are the responsibility of doctors called Allergy & Immunologists. Such doctors test for allergy sensitivities, and then treat with "immunotherapy." Some people may need these injections seasonally or annually for many years. Some symptoms require immediate treatment with an Epi-pen or an ER visit.

Additionally, 1 in 12 people suffer from Asthma. Asthma can kill. 3,262 adults and 185 children died in 2007. Treatment is best rendered by a specialist who may prescribe inhalers, nebulizers, medication, talk therapy, immunotherapy injections, and a healthy active lifestyle.

School Supplies for Children in Need—at Lakehurst Elementary School. We will collect your donations at both entrances to the sanctuary until **August 18.** Thank you.






