Worship

is at the heart of our life in The Presbyterian Church, Lakehurst, NJ, for in worship our relationship with God and one another is given meaning and strength.



Traditional Worship—10 Sunday mornings. This is who we are: a traditional Presbyterian Church. We love to hear the organ and to sing old familiar hymns. We appreciate a sermon that is inspiring, comforting and challenging (and most of all, short). We celebrate the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper on the first Sunday of each month. We include the children in the beginning of the worship service and we let them be children: exploring the sanctuary and saying whatever is on their mind.

We have a choir that glorifies God with their musical gifts, even as they have fun with one another. They are always open to receiving new singers. They practice from 1:00 to 2:30 on Wednesdays and 9:15 on Sunday morning.

But we realize that not everyone appreciates Traditional Worship. So, on February2, at 5 pm, we are starting **a new community**—that will meet in the Living Room, and be lay-led—where people will watch a 10-minute thought-provoking video, and discuss pressing life issues.



Come As U R is for people who don't want to listen to a preacher; who do other things on Sunday morning, and who have rejected organized religion, but sense something missing in their life.

Glenn Milana will facilitate the gathering at **5 pm on Sunday, Feb. 2**, when the topic is RAIN: Are there storms in your life? How do you deal with the storms? Why don't you join us, and bring a friend.

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From the Pastor

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Diana Butler Bass, a church historian, recently wrote about **Civil Religion** in America. She writes: America's public God has had many faces throughout our history: the stern God of Puritan Calvinism; the revolutionary God of Deist Providence; the activist God of Protestant Benevolence; the sword-wielding

God of the Civil War; the earnest God of Progress; the tolerant God of Judeo-Christian America. As a people, we have a great capacity to create God in our image, a deity that baptizes each new American generation with a sense of destiny, purpose, and meaning. As we become a more religiously diverse nation, a new Civil Religion is being born.

Today, more than one third of young adults under 30 claim no religious identity; another third belong to new immigrant faiths. The percentage of Americans who reject organized religion is now 20%. By 2013, the "unaffiliated" formed the second largest religious group in the U.S., coming in slightly behind Roman Catholics. And congregations struggle for survival in this shifting religious landscape.

What is happening is a shift from American Civil Religion to American Civil Spirituality, where both religious people and non-religious people are developing a common language so that we may continue to speak of God. For example, we say that America is on a journey, which is a central theme to many faiths: the Buddhist seeking enlightenment; a Native American on a vision quest; a Muslim embarked on the Hajj; a Jew hoping for "next year in Jerusa-lem" at Passover; a Catholic visiting a shrine; a Protestant tracing the footsteps of Paul; a humanist celebrating Thomas Jefferson at Monticello. Religious people—and non-religious ones as well—understand pilgrimage as the call to leave the familiar for an uncertain destination, toward a new understanding of who we are and who we might be.

The American journey is not aimless. Instead, it is a journey toward a deep realization of community, prosperity, mutual care, stewardship of the Earth, peacemaking, and human rights. These six ideals form an American creed. Each one of these could be interpreted as Christian or Jewish (as they have traditionally been) or could be much more widely understood through other religious perspectives. *The God of this emerging Civil Spirituality is a personal spirit*—*the relational presence of inclusion, community, empathy, irony, justice, and service.* Most the-ists can recognize this God in their own religious traditions; most non-theists can interpret this sort of God as a spirit of beauty or justice in humankind.

As American pluralism grows and deepens, it is very possible that this sense of **communal spirituality** will mature and bind us together, as did Civil Religion in the past. As we at Lakehurst open our doors and invite people to **Come as U R**; as we go about our daily errands, and as we speak with our children and grandchildren, let us look for that common desire for community, prosperity, mutual care, peace, care for the earth and human dignity. And as trust grows, let us share our faith in Jesus Christ.

2014 Per Capita – contribution for active members is **\$35.20** for the whole year. The Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) is a "connectional" church in which local congregations receive support, resources and guidance from the denomination. We work together, and the per capita assessment supports the mission of the denomination. The Lakehurst Church pays per capita for **all**



active members whether or not you contribute to it. So, if at all possible, we ask active members to pay the **\$35.20 per capita**. A blue envelope for this purpose is in your box of offering envelopes.

on hand. Donations of canned soup, vegetables, meats, tuna, peanut butter and jelly, pasta and sauce, and cereal are always appreciated. Members can use the pantry throughout the month. 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Christian Education

Seeing Through Your "Eye" Teeth By BJ Nelson, Parish Nurse



Taking care of our teeth should be something we do without thinking. We are taught as children to brush, floss, not eat too many sweets, and keep 6 month appointments with our dentist. But as we get older, we slip up, Medicare does not cover dental care, fillings fall out, teeth break, etc. There are discount dental plans one can purchase that cover preventative visits, exams, teeth cleaning, x-rays and then they cover problem visits like fillings, tooth extractions and dentures on a percentage payment. They cover 15-60% of these services.

There are many different companies to choose from; just go online and search for "dental insurance." A degree of searching and comparison is involved, but a good plan can be located. Even if you are lucky enough to have some dental coverage, there still may be hefty co-pays. The common cry, "I'm afraid of the dentist" can leave you with some expensive work that needs to be done when you put it off long enough. The bottom line is to take good care of your teeth. Think of it this way, you're being spied on regarding you dental hygiene: seeing through your "eye" teeth. So maintain all those old childhood habits and keep your 6 month check-ups.
