The Officers whom you elected, engaged in a lively, thoughtful, faithful discussion. They see more people, more children, a larger choir in 2017. They see us having a big dinner in the redecorated Upper Room-with videotaped testimonials from beloved members who moved away and cannot attend the dinner.

They see us "connected" in new ways too-coming together to worship and study and serve whenever we can. But also reaching people through technology: computer website, podcasts of worship services, Facebook Bible studies, sacred music presentations, and informal, interactive gatherings later in the day. We recognized that many friends-of-friends are viewing the Church's page on Facebook, and their making a 'comment' or clicking 'like' may be the extent of their 'worship' today.

The Officers see the church engaged in these three areas of ministry: (1) ministry with children through Sunday School, Scouts, Vacation Bible School, and whatever God calls us to do; (2) ministry of music which offers choral pieces that enhance our worship, as well as afternoon presentations that are open to the public, and (3) ministry to homebound peopleremembering and caring for people who cannot come to church, with a visit and communion. A deacon said that when her grandmother turned 100, church members sent a tape of them singing "Happy Birthday" to her, and expressing their gratitude and blessings.

What are your thoughts? What do you think God expects of us? How might you participate? Please let me and your Elders and Deacons know, and pray for guidance and energy.

- Day 5: Woman at the Well water for physical needs


SAVE THE DATE & BRING YOUR CHILDREN!

At its meeting in March, the Church Council approved **a pilot "Parish Nurse" program**. We have eight nurses in our faith community. While Parish Nurses *do not* and *cannot* do any medical tasks, they serve an important role in the life of the Church.

A Parish Nurse serves as a bridge between the medical and religious communities; that is, they can accompany us (by phone or in person) through a health challenge; help translate unfamiliar terms, and listen as we explore options and decide on a treatment plan. Parish Nurses also serve as resources: they can take blood pressures (after worship) and provide literature related to health of body, mind and spirit. So far, Donna Lemanski and BJ Nelson have written newsletter articles on the nationally-focused 'illness of the month.' Let us know what you would like to see next.

Questions and Answers About Arthritis? By BJ Nelson, Parish Nurse




Osteoarthritis (OA) is common as we age. Main causes include aging joints, previous injuries, heredity, overuse, and obesity. Symptoms of OA include joint pain, swelling, and stiffness. OA may affect any joint. OA treatment depends on the joint involved, but often includes medication and exercise. There is no special OA diet, but weight loss may improve symptoms.

Arthritis is a general term that means inflammation of the joints. OA, or "wear and tear" arthritis, is the most common type. It is associated with a breakdown of cartilage in joints. Cartilage serves as a "shock absorber." It commonly occurs in the weight bearing joints of the hips, knees, and spine. OA affects an estimated 27 million Americans. Other "types" of arthritis include: Fibromyalgia, Gout, Psoriatic Arthritis, and Rheumatoid Arthritis.

Here are simple ways you can manage OA symptoms on your own, at home.

- 1. Stay active. Exercise strengthens your muscles and bones. When you're in pain, the last thing you want to do is exercise, but it's actually one of the best things you can do for your joints. Talk to your doctor about what exercises are most appropriate for you.
- 2. Physical therapy is also a common part of treatment in people with OA. To see the most improvement, combine these three types of exercises into your routine: Aerobic exercises, including walking, dancing, and riding a bicycle; Strength-training exercises, such as lifting weights; and stretching exercises.
- 3. Lose weight if appropriate. Eating a healthy, low-fat diet rich in vegetables, fruits, whole grains, and lean proteins will help you control your weight.
- 4. A heating pad or cold pack can feel really good on achy joints. Unless you've got an injury, in which case cold is optimal for the first day. Use as directed by your medical professional, cold or heat, several times a day; just remember to cover the cold pack with a towel and keep your heating pad at a low setting to avoid burning your skin. Whether you use heat or cold, remove it after 20 to 30 minutes.



The Food Pantry is open from **10 to 11 am on the 4**th **Wednesday** of each month. Members of the church can 'shop' for food at other times by contacting Elder Kim Milana or the pastor. Donations of canned vegetables, tuna, peanut butter and jelly, pasta and sauce, and cereal are appreciated. If you can help sort and shelve the food any time, or bag or distribute food and greet our neighbors on the 4th Wednesday, please let Elder Kim Milana know.

At the Deacon-Elder Retreat on April 27, we discussed an article by Thom Rainer entitled "*Autopsy* of a Deceased Church: 11 Things I Learned." We were pleased to see that we are NOT doing many things that lead to a church's demise. But #11 gave us pause. It reads:

11. **The facilities continued to deteriorate**. It wasn't really a financial issue. Instead, the members failed to see the continuous deterioration of the church building. Simply stated, they no longer had "outsider eyes."

While we were excited that the Upper Room had standing-room-only after the Easter Cantata, a deacon recalled her daughter saying, "this room is depressing." In May, we hope to engage a painting contractor to spruce up the room. We are in the process of getting proposals.

We are also replacing the 5-gallon toilets with 1.6-gallon toilets. (**Thank you to "anonymous**" who donated funds for three of the new toilets! No brass plaques!) This change will save us \$1,000 a year in water charges. And save water—as the children will be learning in VBS this summer!
